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MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends,

With 2022 underway, one thing is clear: Whitaker Center for Science and the Arts is thriving and well-positioned to cultivate a brighter future.

Starting from a community need for a cultural hub in downtown Harrisburg, Whitaker Center has grown to be a leader in Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) engagement in Central Pennsylvania. We've become known across the region for our hands-on educational programs, world-class documentaries, immersive exhibits, and live performances. Building on this reputation, we spent 2021 finding new ways to enhance our offerings through innovative spaces, programs, technology, collaborations, and philanthropic initiatives that merged the arts and sciences that transform our community.

Keeping the Performing Arts Alive

One of Whitaker Center's highlights has always been our performing arts programs. After a year of cancellations and postponements, Whitaker Center reactivated live performances at the Sunoco Performance Theater, providing safe and exciting experiences for community members to engage in the arts once again. We also expanded our usual line-up of theatrical performances, dance recitals, comedians, and concerts to include live-streamed events and the use of our spaces and equipment by local, displaced artists.

Innovative Spaces and Programs

Over the last few years, Whitaker Center has transformed its spaces and programs to meet modern learning needs. Our Education Team works diligently to update the curriculum of our well-established programs, including Girls in STEM

workshops, Little Learners, and summer camps while also developing new virtual and in-person offerings. One of our favorite new programs launched in 2021 was our first Space Day Celebration. Held during World Space Week, this day-long program featured three-time space shuttle astronaut, Dr. Jan Davis, and a range of space education activities that lit up every corner of the building.

Whitaker Center's dedicated educators will be expanding their portfolio of programming into the new PNC Innovation Zone that opened in May 2022. This 21st-century educational space, featuring the Purposeful Gaming Studio and a technology-enabled conference room, will further establish Whitaker Center as a leader in the next era of STEAM learning, where art and science intersect to drive innovation. With 30 computer stations, Purposeful Gaming Studio offers expanded broadband, state-of-the-art audio and visual equipment, and bleacher-style seating. It is the ultimate location to leverage students' interests in video games with an array of educational and professional mentorship programs.

New Philanthropic Initiatives

Three new philanthropic initiatives launched in 2021 making new programs and spaces possible. They include the Gender and Racial Equity Network, Next Gen Initiative, and Space Education Fund.

The Gender & Racial Equity Network represents a group of individuals, foundations, and corporations interested in supporting diversity in STEAM engagement. Through their support, we can offer a variety of equity-based programs, ranging from Youth Rise - Stand Together to the Girls in STEM Initiative. Thanks to supporters like you, the network has raised over \$300,000.

The Next Gen Initiative, spearheaded by Board Members Nicole Conway and Meron Yemane, connects young philanthropists with transformational opportunities at Whitaker Center. Next Gen members

attended their first event in November 2021, where they received a preview of PNC Innovation Zone and explored ways to support programming in the space. We look forward to collaborating with Next Gen members as we continue on our path of transformation in 2022.

The Space Education Fund was made possible through a generous leadership gift from R. Timothy and Mary Webber Weston. The fund will support space-related educational activities to encourage people of all ages to "imagine beyond" and consider our place in space and the universe, now and into the future. Topics for space education will cover how space exploration has contributed to our lives, future possibilities of new discoveries and new technologies, sustainability in space travel, on Earth, and beyond.

For over two decades, we have stood on the shoulders of our founders and their vision. It is their successes that made our growth and transformation of 2021 possible. As we continue our journey, we are inspired by both long-term supporters and new champions stepping up to cultivate this new age of Whitaker Center. KidsPlace

The Gary and Sylvie St. Hilaire Gallery

Designed with a cityscape theme, this newly renovated gallery offers a collection of kid-friendly exhibits and fun activities for young children ages 0-5. Phase III renovations were completed in 2021, including installation of the new Pinball Falls exhibit - a visitor favorite! This project increased gallery space by more than 25% and doubled the number of exhibits. New attractions in this space include the x-ray table, life-size operation game, fishin'-hole, slate drawing wall and reading tree.

Select Medical Digital Cinema


Our Select Medical Digital Cinema provides the premier movie-going experience in Central Pennsylvania. With our transition to a laser projector, the cinema now also functions as Harrisburg's largest computer screen. This projector enhances our ability to offer cutting-edge STEAM educational programs and esports events. This new technology works synergistically with our new PNC Innovation Zone and Purposeful Gaming Studio where the small screen can move to the big screen.





PNC INNOVATION ZONE FEATURING THE PURPOSEFUL GAMING STUDIO

The new PNC Innovation Zone presents an opportunity for Whitaker Center to engage K-12 students and offer unique educational opportunities that build upon the explosive popularity of esports and video games. This high-tech space offers STEAM programming designed to introduce and reinforce both computational abilities and soft skills.



PNC Innovation Zone is a featured venue for the **National STEM Gaming Network**, a country-wide collaboration of science and technology centers committed to promoting esports and purposeful gaming as a platform for learning. This space hosts esports and gaming tournaments, featuring popular games like Fortnite and Rocket League.

WHITAKER CENTER'S FIRST SPACE DAY CELEBRATION

FORMER NASA ASTRONAUT DR. JAN DAVIS



We were honored to feature, Dr. Jan Davis, a NASA Astronaut and rocket engineer, as our special event speaker. A veteran of three space shuttle flights, Dr. Davis logged over 673 hours in space. As an accomplished engineer, she supported major NASA programs and projects; including the Hubble Space Telescope and the Chandra X-ray Observatory. She is a leader in making space travel safe, serving as the team lead for the redesign of the Shuttle Solid Rocket Booster Aft External Tank Attach ring after the break-up of the Challenger Shuttle and as the Director of Safety and Mission Assurance that led to the Return to Flight of the Space Shuttle after the Columbia Shuttle incident. Dr. Davis shared her experiences and met with visitors for questions and autographs.

On October 9, 2021; Whitaker Center launched our first-ever Space Day Celebration as part of World Space Week, an international celebration of science and technology, and their contribution to the betterment of the human condition.

Visitors of all ages joined us for a day of hands-on activities and explorations centered on the theme "Women in Space." Activities, including Mars Rover Cubelet modular robotics, lunar landing, telescope, and constellation workshops, encouraged visitors to "imagine beyond" and consider our place in space and the universe, now and into the future. In addition to hands-on activities, visitors joined a special viewing of Apollo 11 First Steps, an exclusive science center documentary in our Select Medical Digital Cinema.





This exciting day was made possible by the new Space Education Fund to support space-related programming and activities at Whitaker Center. R. Timothy and Mary Webber Weston have generously provided the seed money and leadership gift to launch this fund.

EDUCATION



Whitaker Center knows that one of our greatest contributions is in the education of Central Pennsylvania's youth. In 2021, our Education Team went to great lengths to provide a safe place for youth to learn and grow when it was needed most. Our extraordinary community partnerships and amplified teamwork allowed us to expand and redesign many of our programs to reflect community needs.

These hands-on programs cover a range of STEAM topics and reach all ages and demographics, on-site, off-site, and virtually. Programs are designed to improve students' critical thinking skills, STEAM abilities, and better prepare them for higher education opportunities and STEAM careers.

Program highlights from 2021 include:

Youth Rise

Big Brothers Big Sisters and Whitaker Center created this program to reach eighth-graders at Susquehanna Middle School. BBBS screened and matched mentors with mentees to foster relationships and support for the students.

During sessions, Whitaker Center runs hands-on STEAM activities and Big Brothers Big Sisters leads discussions for the students. The goal of the program is for students to have meaningful interactions with professionals of color and to bridge the gaps in opportunity for youth in the Capital Region.

STEAM Summer Camps

The Summer of 2021 was our largest camp season yet, with over 600 K-6 STEAM campers, 20 Science of Surgery campers, and 118 Girls in STEM Campers. In partnership with Penn State Health and Penn State College of Medicine, our new Science of Surgery camp invited 20 high school students to explore careers of healthcare professionals from diverse backgrounds. The experience included opportunities for enrichment in science, medicine, and technology, with hands-on basic surgical training such as suturing, central lines, chest tubes, and intubation.



Surgery Live! Extension Experience

In the last 13 years, over 18,500 students have participated in Surgery Live! Now, students can practice their skills in a 30-minute extension program following Surgery Live! viewing. Students engage in interactive activities, such as suturing practice and virtual surgeries to reinforce and enrich their knowledge from the procedure seen earlier that morning. In 2021, roughly 50% of in-person groups participated in the new extension.

Whitaker Center also expanded the number of one-day community outreach programs, including:

- Farm Show
- Engineering Weekend/Introduce a Girl to Engineering Night
- Pre-K STEAM Day
- Earth Day
- Girls in STEM Expo
- Space Day
- Chemistry Day

Building on the groundwork of 2021, we are excited to announce the launch of new programs in 2022 that fill gaps in our community's educational needs.

Innovation 101 - launching in Fall 2022, this two-hour, drop-off program for students in grades 2-8 will be based in the PNC Innovation Zone. Each session will include technology-based activities designed to introduce and reinforce computational thinking skills.

Pre-K Professional Development - In this newly developed course, Whitaker Center's Early STEM Education Manager uses science process skills as a framework to help teachers discover the science that is already happening every day in their classrooms and give them resources and strategies to support children's science learning in simple and effective ways.



SURGERY LIVE!

In 2008, Whitaker Center for Science and the Arts and Penn State Milton S. Hershey Medical Center created Surgery Live! an innovative partnership designed to stimulate the interest of high school students for careers in health care. With the support of Highmark BlueShield, this program transports students to the operating rooms of Hershey Medical Center through interactive, high-definition videoconferencing technology that is displayed on the 40-foot high screen of the Select Medical Digital Cinema. As students view procedures in our 200-seat venue, a facilitator guides a discussion with operating room staff, demonstrates surgical instruments used in the operation and explains factors that cause disease and contribute to conditions that place patients on the operating table. The program then transitions live to the operating room where students see and hear the surgical teams and watch the same view that is on the surgeon's screen. The surgeon explains each step of the procedures and invites students to ask questions during the program.

Over the past 13 years, more than 18,000 students have attended Surgery Live! programs at Whitaker Center for Science and the Arts. These have included procedures such as cholecystectomy, hysterectomy, and various endoscopic, gastric and urological surgeries.

In 2021, Whitaker Center expanded this remarkable program in two significant ways. First, we expanded our reach by offering it virtually through webinar software. The other enhancement was that we created a Surgery Live! "Extension Experience" for students and educators who attended the program at Whitaker Center. The Extension Experience provides students with hands-on, interactive activities such as mock intubations, which reinforce and enrich their knowledge of the procedure seen earlier that morning.

Diversity by the Numbers


The STEM workforce is 89% white and 72% male, while the overall workforce is 78% white and 53% male. (National Science Foundation)

Women of color earn the smallest share (14.1%) of bachelor's degrees in STEM. (National Center for Education Statistics)

Representation of women in STEM fields was declining in the mid-2010s, and the representation of minorities has shown very minimal growth. (New York Times)

From 1988 to 2010, over half a million people took a gender-science implicit association test. More than 70% associated men with sciences and women with arts. (Project Implicit)
